Prime Minister Suga Attends G7 Meeting to Discuss Afghanistan

On Aug. 24, Prime Minister Suga Yoshihide joined his Group of Seven counterparts in a virtual meeting to discuss the situation in Afghanistan.

Japan Welcomes Nomination of New US Ambassador to Japan

The government of Japan welcomes the nomination of Rahm Emanuel - whose past duties include Mayor of Chicago, White House Chief of Staff, and US

Congressman - as the new US Ambassador to Japan. On Aug. 23, Press Secretary YOSHIDA Tomoyuki issued a statement that Japan expects Mr. Emanuel will assume his new post at an early date, and that "Japan will closely cooperate with Mr. Rahm Emanuel and make efforts to further strengthen the Japan-U.S. Alliance and realize a Free and Open Indo-Pacific."

Olympics Wrap-Up: <u>Baron</u> <u>Nishi Riding Crop Gifting In</u> Japan by Masi Oka

On July 31, 2021 in Tokyo, actor & producer Masi Oka returned the riding crop of 1932 Olympian Baron Nishi – the only Japanese ever to win a gold medal in equestrian – to his great-grandson Mitsuhiko Nishi. Masi Oka played a pivotal role in connecting the LA84 Foundation with Japan's Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology (MEXT), Japan Sports Agency, Japan Equestrian Federation, and the Nishi family for the historic gifting. Olympics Wrap-up: KABC's David Ono in Japan

Ahead of the Tokyo 2020 Games, KABC7 anchor and journalist David Ono visited Japan and reported on how Japan planned to handle the Olympic games during the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, he met with Kuma Kengo, an architect involved with the design of the Japan National Stadium - a key venue of the Tokyo 2020 Games - and what inspired the structure's construction. He also examined how Japan has viewed the Tokyo 2020 Games as an opportunity to pursue further development of hydrogen technologies, and how some cities in Japan and Southern California are embracing hydrogen technology as a new power source for the future.



Latest on COVID-19 in Japan: Vaccinations Up

The pace of vaccinations is accelerating in Japan, with over 127 million doses administered to date to the general public as of Aug. 29. In addition, the government of Japan has

decided to provide around <u>40,000 of COVID-19 vaccines manufactured domestically,</u> <u>through the COVAX facility, to Tonga.</u> At the Ninth Pacific Islands Leaders Meeting (PALM9) which took place on July 2, Japan announced its intention to provide Pacific Island countries with a total of approximately 3 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines by around the end of the year including through the COVAX Facility.

At the end of the Tokyo 2020 Olympic games, <u>Dr. Brian McCloskey, Chair of the Tokyo</u> <u>2020 Independent Expert Panel, noted that comprehensive screening testing initiatives,</u> <u>track and trace programs, and public health and socials measures contributed to keeping</u> <u>participants as well as the people of Japan safe</u>. Tokyo 2020 carried out 651,296 tests from July 1 to Aug. 7, while local health authorities conducted another 42,711 tests at Tokyo's main airports, according to the International Olympic Committee. Among participants of the games, the cumulative positivity rate was just 0.02%, while the positivity rate at the airports was just 0.09%, the IOC's data showed. This suggests that COVID-19 countermeasures proved effective at the Games, and may offer a blueprint for other large-scale events.

Inscriptions of Japanese Sites on the World Heritage List

On July 26, <u>"Amami-Oshima Island, Tokunoshima Island, the Northern part of Okinawa</u> <u>Island and Iriomote Island</u>" and on July 27 <u>"Jomon Prehistoric Sites in Northern</u> <u>Japan</u>" were inscribed on the World Heritage List at the Extended 44th Session of the World Heritage Committee. Foreign Minister Motegi noted that the Ministry of Foreign Affairs will continue to make efforts to promote understanding of the value of Japan's World Heritage properties in the world. The 19th World Cosplay Summit 2021 was held in Nagoya on Aug. 7-8 and livestreamed to viewers worldwide. The summit was held in a hybrid format, with photo sessions and stage

events held, as well as the "World Cosplay Championship Video Division," or performance videos from cosplayers from 30 countries and regions. A German team won the Championship and was awarded the Foreign Minister's Prize by Ms. TSUDA Yoko, Director of the Cultural Affairs and Overseas Public Relations Division, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan.
