In response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine, the government of Japan has announced

measures such as the provision of loans to Ukraine. In addition, Japan will offer visa extensions to any Ukranians in Japan who wish to receive one. Other measures include financial measures, including restrictions on transactions with Russia's central bank, and export control.

<u>Blinken in Australia</u>, on the sidelines of the Japan-Australia-India-U.S. Foreign Ministers' meeting. On Feb. 12, the Japanese foreign minister met <u>with Blinken and Chung Eui-yong, Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Korea for a trilateral meeting in Honolulu, Hawaii.</u>



Guidance on Japan's Border Control Measures Related to COVID-19 (as of March 1)

On Feb. 24, 2022, new border measures were announced to take effect on March 1, including a change of home quarantine period for cross-border

travelers and returnees from the US who obtain vaccination certificates with booster

Latest on COVID-19 in Japan: Vaccinations Up

In Japan, over 227 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines have been administered to date to the general public as of Feb. 28, 2022 with 79.38% of the population now fully vaccinated. Japan is currently working to accelerate the administration of booster shots. Currently, only 19.31% of Japan's population has been boosted compared to 28.40% in the US, according to data fom Nikkei/The Financial Times. As of Feb. 28, the total number of COVID-19 cases stood at 4,954,865 in Japan, and 78,939,203 in the United States, according to the Coronavirus Resource Center, Johns Hopkins University & Medicine.

Arizona Foreign Direct Investment Event and Meetings

On Feb. 10, the Consulate General of Japan in Los Angeles, supported by the Global Chamber and the Thunderbird

School of Global Management at Arizona State University, hosted a panel discussion on "Arizona's Growing Role in Semiconductor Security and Supply Chain - Global Investments and the View from Japan". Consul General Muto, Phoenix Mayor Kate Gallego, Dean Sanjeev Khagram of Thunderbird School of Global Management, CEO Doug Bruhnke of Global Chamber, Japanese companies, JETRO Los Angeles, and about 40 others participated in-person. The event was held in a hybrid format, and included virtual appearances by U.S. Senator Mark Kelly and Intel Corporation. In this Arizona trip, Consul General Muto also met with Arizona House of Representatives Speaker Russell Bowers, Phoenix Mayor Kate Gallego, and Scottsdale Mayor David Ortega to discuss future cooperation between Japan and Arizona in areas such as semiconductors and the environmental protection.
